Honoring Black History Month: Learning, Reflection, and Meaningful Action

February invites us into an important opportunity, not just to teach Black history, but to reflect on how we honor it in ways that are thoughtful, accurate, and meaningful for students at every age. Black History Month is not only about highlighting influential figures or historic moments, though those stories absolutely matter. It is also about helping students understand how Black history is woven into the fabric of our shared past, present, and future. When taught with care, Black history fosters empathy, critical thinking, and a deeper understanding of identity, resilience, creativity, and justice.

Resources provided include trusted, educator-vetted materials designed to support schools and classrooms in moving beyond surface-level celebrations. These tools center lived experiences, elevate authentic voices, and encourage learning that is inclusive rather than performative. The Learning for Justice article thoughtfully explores the dos and don'ts of teaching Black History Month, offering clarity around common pitfalls while encouraging educators to approach the month with purpose and care. You'll also find classroom-ready ideas from Edutopia, with resources tailored to different grade levels and learning environments. In addition, PBS offers a rich collection of videos, lesson ideas, primary sources, and storytelling tools that bring history to life and invite students into deeper engagement.
